

RECENT ACQUISITIONS

Since March 1968 much new material has been added to the Archives. Listed here in chronological order are acquisitions of originals and xerox copies of Russell's manuscripts and typescripts. Information on their first publication (if any) follows the physical description of each item, and then McMaster's source for the material. Correspondence, tapes, photographs, and miscellaneous items will be listed in subsequent issues of Russell. Material from the Russell estate has also not been included this time. Some readers may have letters from Russell or know the whereabouts, in institutions or elsewhere, of other manuscripts or correspondence. It is essential for the Archives to collect copies of such items to make them available at some time - perhaps many years from now - for "the definitive biography" and for a possible complete edition of Russell's writings. Any help in locating more material will be warmly appreciated and acknowledged.

Note on abbreviations: Ms means manuscript in Russell's handwriting; Ts - typescript; MsS or TsS = manuscript or typescript signed by Russell. Information in square brackets has been supplied by the Archives.
