McMaster's Inter-Library Loan Office has reason to feel proud. After four years of repeated attempts, it recently received its first item from China. The item? "Bertrand Russel [sic] Gives Impressions of China", published in the English-language Peking Leader, 16(?) Dec. 1920. Now I.L.L. is going back for other articles Russell published in China.

An excellent translator has been found for the three new Swedish articles by Russell. She is Miss Naomi Walford. I recommend her.

For those who still remember my query in Russell 1, p. 12: a letter from Russell to his publisher, Stanley Unwin, dated 17 July 1947, instructs him to substitute "some" for "Wittgenstein" in the Introduction to the second edition of The Principles of Mathematics, p. ix, line 9. It is not known whether Wittgenstein ordered this change.

Contributors. Barry Feinberg and Ronald Kasrils are associated with the Bertrand Russell Estate. Both are South African exiles. Peter Weinrich contributed to the Archives his Index of Books Referred to in Russell's Own Books. Stephen Alpert is completing an M.A. in philosophy at McMaster. William Ready is the author of Necessary Russell and besides brought the Russell Archives to McMaster. Marion Kearns was working for the University of Toronto Library when John Slater suggested to her the research project of a bibliography of Alys Russell. Harry Ruja is Professor of Philosophy at San Diego State University and is my partner in the new bibliography of Russell.

<u>Inflation</u>. Because the last four *Russells* have been double the size of previous issues, printing costs have almost doubled. *Russell* has also become too large for Darlene and Diane to collate, fold and staple; and with 289 subscriptionsit's better to go to Addressograph than type out addresses anew for each mailing.
