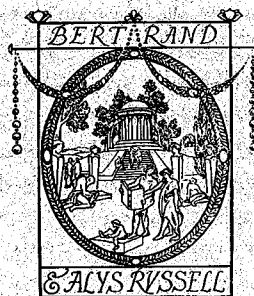


## Russell's bookplate



The Leithauser article mentioned Bertrand and Alys Russell's bookplate. We are able to reproduce it here because of the recent acquisition of a book once owned by Bertrand and bearing the bookplate. The book is F.H. Bradley's *The Principles of Logic* (London: Kegan Paul, Trench, & Co., 1883). Russell acquired the volume in June 1893 and read it in September 1893 and January 1898. Ian Hacking, from whom McMaster got it through the good offices of John G. Slater, bought it from a Cambridge bookseller who was selling the library of G.H. Hardy. It is speculated that Hardy borrowed it from Russell and neglected to return it. The book's chief value lies not in the bookplate but in Russell's verbal marginalia. There are about 50 of them.
