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PERPLEXITIES

Most annotations for Volume 12 have been drafted and await first revi-

sions. Even the elusive George Chatterton-Hill has finally been fully documented. Our researcher in London, Fred Keay, found his death date to be 1947. Chatterton-Hill proved difficult because his anti-British position on World War I made him *persona non grata*.

Among the few remaining puzzles in Volume 12 are these:

- (1) The quotation in “The Perplexities of John Forstice”, “First become a King, and then enjoy your Kingdom”, has not been identified.
- (2) In his journal, Russell makes a review of the events of the previous year on his birthday in 1903. He mentions that in June 1902 came “May Shuckburgh’s tragedy, which was very overwhelming”. She belonged to the family of Dr. E. S. Shuckburgh, a Classical scholar at Emmanuel College, Cambridge. But what was her tragedy?
- (3) Also in the journal, he mentions having lunched on 13 November 1902 with Mrs. Napier. The only clues to her identity are that another guest at the luncheon was the distinguished historian G. P. Gooch and the host was Sir George Prothero. Knowing her friends has not helped us with her identity so far.
