Other topics still subject to confirmation include: his aesthetic views prior to 1900, the development of his ethic, his "conversion" experience and his relationship with his brother, Frank.

The first part of the conference is scheduled for 24-25 June 1983 at McMaster. Further details about the programme will appear in the next issue of *Russell*.
