## Editor's notes

**Price increase.** It is necessary to announce the first increase in subscription rates since 1979. The costs of producing *Russell* have risen dramatically in the past year, and even the present increase will not prevent a sizeable deficit this year and possibly next. Increased postal rates have meant, too, that postage must be charged as an additional item. Subscription renewals will be most appreciated at this time.

**Contributors.** GLADYS GARNER LEITHAUSER is teaching English at the University of Michigan—Dearborn. NADINE COWAN DYER is writing a dissertation on T. S. Eliot and mysticism. MARGARET MORAN is a post-doctoral fellow of the Russell Editorial Project. Her dissertation was on John Cowper Powys's novels. DR. HARLEY is continuing his research on Beacon Hill School. DR. SPADONI is Assistant Russell Archivist. Professor of English at McMaster, ANDREW BRINK is expanding his *Loss and Symbolic Repair*. On leave from Archives and Research Collections at McMaster, Bruce Whiteman is completing a bibliography of Raymond Souster, the Canadian poet. YOUR EDITOR is giving a "Portrait of a Philosopher of Science" at the Minnesota conference (see below), and a paper on textual theory at the Toronto Conference on Editorial Problems. This year the conference concerns polymaths.

New bibliographical item. A new early letter to the editor of a weekly paper, *The Common Cause*, has been discovered. The letter, which appeared 28 April 1910, concerns women's suffrage. Russell suggests that in the next election a placard be printed reading: "NOT ABLE TO VOTE / Paupers, Lunatics, Criminals and / WOMEN HAVE NO VOTE." John Slater has discovered that the German translation of *The Prospects of Industrial Civilization* (1923), which Russell co-authored with Dora Russell, contains a new preface by him. A translation may appear in a future issue. Dr. Slater has also discovered that Viscount Amberley's *Analysis of Religious Belief* was published in the U.S. with a preface saying that the work was suppressed in England.

Recent acquisitions. Some notable acquisitions of late include an Au-

gustus John drawing of Russell c. 1913, a long-lost album, kept by Kate Amberley, of letters from famous personages, and some 2,000 letters, in which Russell is often discussed, from Lady Constance Malleson to a good friend of hers. Archives and Research Collections has acquired the vast general correspondence of C. K. Ogden, a friend of Russell's and of whom Dora Russell has written a memoir. The Russell Editorial Project materially aided the acquisition of some of these items because of their relevance to editorial work.

**Minnesota conference.** The University of Minnesota Center for Philosophy of Science is holding a conference on Bertrand Russell's Philosophy of Science on 25–28 June 1982. The speakers include Elizabeth Ramsden Eames on "Cause in the Later Russell". One purpose of the conference is to honour the memory of the late Grover Maxwell, who published several major expositions of Russell's later philosophy of science.

**BRS annual meeting.** The annual meeting of The Bertrand Russell Society is being held in Los Angeles on 25-27 June. Possibly next year the Society will return to McMaster, when the first of the Russell studies conferences announced in the last issue will be held. (See the Supplement, pp. 94–5.)
