A secondary educational bibliography of Bertrand Russell

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THIS CHECKLIST OF eighty-four items is a chronological compilation of published secondary material on Russell's educational thought and his progressive school, Beacon Hill, which he ran with his second wife, Dora Russell (née Black), from 1927 to their separation in 1932. Primary material on this topic (i.e. material written by Russell himself) will appear in Harry Rujala and Kenneth Blackwell's Russell bibliography.

The checklist excludes reviews (both of Russell's books and those of other authors) and theses. We exclude these two categories not because we believe them to be unimportant but because they each deserve their own bibliographies. John Dewey, for example, wrote a notable review of *Education and the Good Life* (i.e. *On Education*)—"A Key to the New World", *The New Republic*, 46 (19 May 1926): 410-11. Of late, Howard Woodhouse and David Harley have each completed their doctoral dissertations at the University of Toronto on different aspects of Russell's educational philosophy. We have included material by and about Dora Russell only to the extent that it directly comments on Beacon Hill School and Russell's educational views; consequently her books such as *Hypatia*, *The Right to be Happy*, etc., are not listed here. One other area of Russell study has been excluded—namely, the Bertrand Russell Case. Since this concerns the problems of censorship and academic freedom, we again think that it can be relegated to a separate bibliography; an entire scrapbook of news clippings and articles on this latter topic was compiled by Russell and his third wife and is part of Archives I.

The following reference tools and sources have been consulted: *Education Index*; *Current Index to Journals in Education*; *British Education Index*; *Humanities Index*; *British Humanities Index*; *Reader's Guide to*

Periodical Literature; *The Philosopher's Index*; *Bulletin signalétique*; *Répertoire bibliographique de la philosophie*; the Russell Archives' supporting library; the Russell "related to" file of publications in the Russell Archives; and bibliographies found in theses. We are especially indebted to Maiorca's 1977, which has provided a number of relevant contributions in foreign languages. We have also checked a Russell Archives' scrapbook which contains early news clippings on Beacon Hill; a few scrapbook clippings on the school are not listed because they unfortunately lacked information on pagination, date and the newspaper where they were published. In listing any publication, we adopted the policy of citing the first edition.

We would greatly appreciate being contacted by readers who have knowledge of other relevant publications. If this checklist helps to stimulate the reading and discussion of Russell's educational works, then its purpose will have been achieved.

It would appear that Russell's side is not extant, although a report entitled "Bertrand Russell Here for a Debate, English Philosopher to Argue Against Will Durant That Education is a Failure" was published in *The New York Times*, 26 Sept. 1929: 5. No transcription of the actual debate is known

to be extant.
