Editor's Notes

¶ALAN SCHWERIN is Chairman of the Department of Political Contributors Science and Philosophy at Monmouth University, New Jersey. He is the new President of the Bertrand Russell Society and delivered, at its annual meeting in June, a paper on "Russell and Vagueness". MICHAEL BYRD is Professor of Philosophy at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He plans a textual collation of Part VII of The Principles of Mathematics, which will complete his study of the changes Russell made in revising the work while it was in press. DAWN OGDEN is a graduate student in philosophy at UBC. She has a doctoral fellowship from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada. A. D. IRVINE, Professor of Philosophy at UBC. is editor of Russell and Analytic Philosophy and Bertrand Russell: Critical Assessments and author of several articles and reviews on Russell. JAN DEJNOŽKA is Visiting Scholar in Law and Philosophy in the Rackham School of Graduate Studies, University of Michigan at Ann Arbor, and Research Fellow in Union College. His Bertrand Russell on Modality and Logical Relevance appeared in this year. ARTHUR FALK, Professor of Philosophy at Western Michigan University, has contributed widely to philosophical journals. KEITH GREEN, Senior Lecturer in Linguistics, Sheffield Hallam University, has published widely in linguistics and critical theory. He is at work on a book, "Scimitars and Spectres: Bertrand Russell, Language and Linguistic Theory". SHEILA TURCON freelances on a variety of archival, editorial and bibliographical ventures in the Mc-Master orbit. She is working for the next two years on my next Collected Papers volume. Louis Greenspan, Professor Emeritus of Religious Studies and Past Director of the Russell Editorial Project at McMaster, has coedited Russell on Religion. SSHRCC has awarded YOUR EDITOR a grant to expedite the editing of the first post-wwii, non-technical volume of the Papers.

There is a prolific future in store for Russell Studies. Stefan Forthcoming Andersson and Louis Greenspan's Russell on Religion (Routledge) is in proof. I. Grattan-Guinness's The Search for Mathematical Roots, 1870–1930 (Princeton U.P.), the second volume of Ray Monk's biography of Russell (Jonathan Cape and Free Press), and Uncertain Paths to Freedom: Russia and China, 1919–22 (Collected Papers, Vol. 15) are expected this year. In 2000 or shortly afterwards are expected the second volume of Nicholas Griffin's Selected Letters of Bertrand Russell (Allan Lane the Penguin P.) and The Cambridge Companion to Russell, Anne-Françoise Schmid's Correspondance Russell—Couturat (Paris: Kime) and Paul Strathern's Bertrand

Russell in 90 Minutes (Chicago: Dee).

¶Bernard Linsky's Russell's Metaphysical Logic (Cambridge U.P.),

Rodríguez-Consuegra's Analisis filosofico (by New Books (Barcelona: Paidos), and Ursula Voss's Bertrand Russell und Lady Morrell (Berlin: Rowohlt) have recently appeared. Oxford U.P. in the uк has reprinted The Problems of Philosophy with an introduction by John Skorupski. A large-print edition of the Problems is available from Transaction.

The annual meeting was held at Monmouth University, West The Bertrand Long Branch, N.J., on 4-6 June 1999. It was a very successful meeting, due in part to the large number of papers that were Russell presented. Dr. Henry Morgentaler was the recipient of the Society Annual Award. Trevor Banks, Russell impersonator, regaled those attending the banquet with what turned out to be his final show. He died

on 19 July. Next year's meeting will again be at Monmouth, on 2–4 June 2000. Because Volume 22, on which it has been my privilege to have

been engaged, has grown so much, it has been split in two. Even Collected more new writings are anticipated from research at the BBC. Papers The first to be completed will be the volume covering Russell's return to England in 1944 until 1947; the second will cover 1948 until his trip to Australia (and the start of the Korean War) in 1950. Because of earlier additions,

it is likely that the first volume will be numbered 23, or even 24.

The number of records in the BRACERS inventory of correspondence remained at 64,212 in July 1999, with one third to go. BRACERS BRACERS proved invaluable in providing printouts of Russell's

correspondence relating to volumes of the Collected Papers in the past year.
