## INDEX TO RUSSELL'S UNPOPULAR ESSAYS

The edition of *Unpopular Essays* indexed here is that of George Allen & Unwin, published in London in 1950. The pagination of Simon and Schuster's edition (New York, 1951) spans pages 1–175 instead of the first British edition's 9–223.

This is Roma Hutchinson's eighth subject and name index for Russell. Her previous indexes were of Which Way to Peace?, Authority and the Individual, New Hopes for a Changing World, The Impact of Society on Society, Portraits from Memory, Fact and Faction and The Collected Stories of Bertrand Russell. A survey of Russell's books shows there are still several that have never been indexed (although Why I Am Not a Christian has now been indexed twice). They are, therefore, not quickly accessible, except where (intellectually limited) word searches of digitized texts are possible. Incidentally, although Russell indexed several of his first books himself, the only extant index in his hand is that of The Philosophy of Leibniz. The manuscript seems to be the second stage, and one cannot tell how he got there.—Ed.
