## Editor's Notes

**JIVOR GRATTAN-GUINNESS is Emeritus Professor of the History** Contributors of Mathematics and Logic at Middlesex University. He lectured recently at the Cambridge and Oxford centennial celebrations of Alan Turing's life. RAY PERKINS, JR. is Professor of Philosophy at Plymouth State University. He is Vice-President of the Bertrand Russell Society. His book Yours Faithfully, Bertrand Russell received the 2002 Book Award of the Bertrand Russell Society, and he recently won that Society's Service Award. GÜLBERK KOC MACLEAN is Assistant Professor in the Department of Humanities at Mount Royal University in Calgary, Alberta. Her PHD dissertation, done at McMaster, was on "Bertrand Russell's Bundle Theory of Particulars". JOSH ZASLOW is a PHD student in philosophy at McMaster. His primary interests include American pragmatism and the history of analytic philosophy. His current research is on foundationalism and epistemic defences of democracy. ANDREW G. BONE is Senior Research Associate at the Russell Centre, having obtained a PHD in modern British history from McMaster. He edited Collected Papers 28 and 29 and coedited 21. He is working on 26 and 27, covering part of the early Cold War, and collaboratively on 16, the early 1920s. STEFAN ANDERS-SON continues to work on his study of the International War Crimes Tribunal and is editing a volume of Richard Falk's writings on the legal, moral and political aspects of the Vietnam War. YOUR EDITOR recently gave a paper to the Russell Society titled "Towards a Centenary Text of The Problems of Philosophy". It dealt with his authorship of it in the summer of 1911 until his last authorized changes to the text in 1966.

## Recent Acquisitions

¶Andrew Malleson has given the Russell Archives his splendidly illustrated and informative volume, *Discovering the Family of Miles Malleson 1888–1969* (290 pp.; privately published, 2012).

The colour photographs and family anecdotes, as well as the factual detail and a dose of psychiatric wit (he practised psychiatry in Toronto for many years), enliven his genealogical research. Dr. Malleson is the son of Miles Malleson, the first husband of Lady Constance Malleson. He also sent the Archives nine poignant letters from Colette, 1957–75. eBay yielded a 1968 letter from Russell in which he mentions that he "expects to be publishing several volumes of correspondence in the near future." Libraries allowed us to have copies of John Foster Dulles' extensive revisions to his 1958 reply to Russell's

open letter to certain "most potent sirs", and of Russell's letter to A. C. Kanaar in 1945 asking him to reply to a critic of Russell's article, "The German Disaster". Finally, we have obtained copies of additional Russell family wills.

## Russell Conferences

The centenary of *The Problems of Philosophy* has engendered two conferences. One is in Glasgow, 29–30 June, organized by the Centre for the Study of Perceptual Experience, on the occasion of its yearly graduate conference, on the theme "*The Prob*-

*lems of Philosophy*: Then and Now". The other, "Bertrand Russell's *The Problems of Philosophy*: the Centenary Conference" is scheduled for 29 November–I December at the University of Mississippi. The contact there is Donovan Wishon. McMaster recently held a cognate conference—unless one's focus is on the non-analytic Chapter 15 of *PP*—namely, the first conference of the Society for the Study of the History of Analytic Philosophy, on 24–26 May 2012.

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Forthcoming Books (Expected in August is *Russell's Unknown Logicism: a Study in the History and Philosophy of Mathematics* by Sébastien Gandon (Palgrave Macmillan). Gregory Landini will explain *Frege's Notations: What They Are and How They Mean* (Palgrave Macmillan). Also

in 2012: Seyed Javad Miri's *Allama Jafari on Bertrand Russell: East and West: the Twain Shall Meet?* (London Academy of Iranian Studies). Expected early in 2013 are John Ongley and Rosalind Carey's *Bertrand Russell: a Guide for the Perplexed* (London and New York: Continuum International), and Carey's *Russell on Meaning: the Rise of Scientific Philosophy* (Palgrave Macmillan).
