[KIRK WILLIS, Associate Professor of History at the Univer-CONTRIBUTORS sity of Georgia, is working on a book manuscript on British nuclear culture since 1945 and has written on Russell and modern Britain for Russell. He introduced the current Routledge reprints of Authority and the Individual and Unpopular Essays. SHEILA TURCON is an archivist who, retired from McMaster Library's Research Collections, has worked on Russell for many years. She writes on Russell's homes for the Bertrand Russell Society Bulletin. Beginning with Ravenscroft, she has described five of them. Her next article will cover his house in Peking and his Chelsea townhome. She is editing the correspondence of Russell with Constance Malleson. STEFAN ANDERSSON continues his research on the IWCT and its legacy and is working on a book of Richard Falk's writings on the Vietnam War. RAY PERKINS, JR. is Emeritus Professor of Philosophy at Plymouth State University. He is vice-president of the Russell Society, from which he received the 2002 Book Award for Yours Faithfully, Bertrand Russell. RUSSELL WAHL is Professor of Philosophy at Idaho State University. He has published on Russell, the history of logic, early modern philosophy and analytic philosophy. He was the 2013 Russell Visiting Professor at McMaster and is a director of the Bertrand Russell Society. NICHO-LAS GRIFFIN is Director of the Bertrand Russell Research Centre and Canada Research Chair in Philosophy at McMaster University. He is the General Editor of The Collected Papers of Bertrand Russell and is currently working with Sébastien Gandon on an edition of the Whitehead-Russell correspondence. YOUR EDITOR spoke on Russell and the start of World War I at the 2014 BRS meeting, has begun revising the Russell Bibliography, and continues his editing of Papers 24 and 25 (when he is not proofing BRACERS).

RECENT ACQUISITIONS ¶Russell's only sporting trophy has been acquired. It's a pewter tankard from his first term at Cambridge, inscribed with the names of all the boat crew of whom "The Hon. B.

Russell" was cox. His signed, printed invitation to his subsection of the International Congress of Mathematicians, 1912; copies of seven letters to Paul Carus, publisher of *The Monist*, 1912–14; the original of a newspaper drawing of him; and various news photographs of him in the 1950s have all come in.

RECENT CONFERENCE ¶On 9–11 January 2015 the Society for the Study of the History of Analytic Philosophy (SSHAP) held a workshop at McMaster. There were excellent papers on Russell's logi-

cism prior to *The Principles of Mathematics* and Russell's use of James on space in *Our Knowledge of the External World*.

HTTP://¶The Russell Archives' annotated catalogue of letters to-
talled 124,600 records by 4 February 2015. That's a growth
of only 650 since last issue; but in that time the database was
converted from the campus mainframe to a new system (de-
vised and maintained within Library Systems), thousands of

entries revised, and B&R references and some images inserted. Among many improvements, records are now web pages, references to other records are hyperlinked, accuracy in foreign names is achievable with accents—and the notes can take logical symbols. The correction and completion of case conversion, italicization and additional linking (by BRRC's Arlene Duncan) from the mainframe's plain all caps has reached 20,000. Completion of the coverage of Russell's letters, at the present rate, is estimated at record 129,000 in five years—with the new database capable of much more than correspondence.
