TONY SIMPSON is Director of the Russell Peace Foundation Ltd. and editor of The Spokesman. He has also uncovered the mantelpiece portraits of Cantor, Leibniz and Spinoza. WILLIAM BRUNEAU is past editor of the BRS Bulletin, coeditor (with Stephen Heathorn) of Collected Papers 18 (in progress) and co-biographer of Jean Coulthard: a Life in Music. GRAHAM P. STEVENS is Reader in Philosophy at the University of Manchester. He is the author of The Theory of Descriptions: Russell and the Philosophy of Language (2011) and a contributor to The Bloomsbury Companion to Bertrand Russell (2019).
